An Anecdotal History of Old Times in Singapore 1819-1867

By CHARLES BURTON BUCKLEY. First published in 1902, this book was intended to keep alive events in the life of Singapore during a period of great expansion and activity. It is one of the principal sources for the history of nineteenth-century Singapore and contains a mine of information on all aspects of British administration and society there. The author, who was born in 1844, was for nearly fifty years one of the best known residents of Singapore, with an intimate knowledge of all facets of Singapore history. During the course of research for this volume, he found the original Treaty made between the Temengong of Johore and Sir Stamford Raffles in 1819, which authorized the British occupation of Singapore. The work covers the period from the foundation of the settlement under the East India Company in 1819 to the transfer to the Colonial Office in 1867. *18 plates.* \$10.15

Writing from Singapore in 1864, Cameron seeks to introduce this city, along with Penang, Province Wellesley, and Malacca, to his Victorian readers. Although the chapters on the history of the Malay peninsula do not bear close scrutiny, the book is valuable for its dollars and cents discussion about the success of the great port and its government. He provides a sharp, balanced picture of the strength and weaknesses of the Straits Settlements. Communalism and the Political Process in Malaya

By K. J. RATNAM, *University of Singapore.* The Federation of Malaya has experienced the problems inherent in a plural society since World War II, when the bulk of the non-Malay population in the country ceased to be transient and became a part of the settled population, demanding widely increased political rights and thereby threatening the privileged position of the Malays. In his book, Mr. Ratnam analyzes these problems by discussing those topics and issues which form the basis for communal disagreement. He examines party politics, the 1955 and 1959 general elections, and the proposal to offer Malay citizenship to the large Chinese segment of the population, considering also the controversy over religion and language.
