# In Memoriam

#### William Ebenstein

One of the profession's most prolific pens was stilled on April 28, 1976, when William Ebenstein, Professor of Political Science at the University of California, Santa Barbara, died of cancer a few weeks short of his 66th birthday. Thus ended the career not only of a widelyknown author, but an extraordinary teacher and lecturer, whose fertile mind and engaging personality won him a host of friends throughout the world.

A native of Austria, William Ebenstein received the L.L.D. degree from the University of Vienna in 1934. Emigrating to England, he
