Information for contributors to the Review: Contributions are welcome whether or not the author is a member of the Association. Manuscripts should be typed on one side of sheet only, double-spaced, and with ample margins for editorial marking. The original and, if possible, one carbon copy should be submitted. Authors are advised to include footnote material in the text wherever possible. Footnotes should be numbered consecutively throughout the article but should not include bibliographical references. These should be incorporated within the text in parentheses with the author's last name, date of publication, and specific pages. An end bibliography with entries arranged by authors' last names should list the complete references and inclusive pages for articles. Articles may be illustrated with line drawings and maps, classified as figures, to be submitted in final form (except for size). Tables should be carefully prepared and should replace text, not duplicate it.
