CONTRIBUTORS

Marcella Hayes is Assistant Professor of History at the University of Wisconsin-Madison. She received her PhD from Harvard University in 2021. Her current book manuscript, tentatively titled "The Black Spaniards: The Color of Political Authority in Seventeenth-Century Lima," centers on the legal, political, and social position of black slaves and free people of color in seventeenth-century Lima.

Brianna Leavitt-Alcántara is Associate Professor of History and Director of Latin American, Caribbean, and Latino/a/x Studies at the University of Cincinnati. Her research focuses on gender and religion in colonial and nineteenth-century Central America. Her book *Alone at the Altar: Single Women and Devotion in Guatemala, 1670–1870* (2018) considers how non-elite single women forged complex alliances with the Catholic Church in Guatemala's colonial capital, and how those alliances significantly shaped local religion and post-independence politics. Her new book project, "The Virgin's Wrath," examines gender relations, Mayan Catholicism, and violence in eighteenth-century Chiapas.

Daniel McDonald is a historian of modern Latin America whose research focuses on citizenship, migration, cities, and social movements in Brazil. His work has been published in the *Journal of Urban History* (2021). Alongside his written scholarship, he works extensively in the digital and public humanities, including a collaborative digitization project with community partners in Brazil. His work has been supported by a Fulbright-Hays Doctoral Dissertation Research Abroad (DDRA) Fellowship and the Tinker Foundation, in addition to grants and fellowships from Brown University and Harvard University. At present, he is a Postdoctoral Fellow at the Humanities Center at the University of Rochester. Previously, he was a Postdoctoral Fellow at the Mahindra Humanities Center at Harvard University.

Gonzalo Romero Sommer is Adjunct Professor of Political Science and International Relations at the Pontificia Universidad Católica del Perú. He received a PhD in History from the State University of New York at Stony Brook. He is co-author with Henry Pease of the book *La política en el Perú del siglo XX* (2013) and co-author with Javier Alcalde of the book *Alineamiento y desafío: la política exterior peruana en los gobiernos de Odría y Velasco* (2014).
