

INSTRUCTIONS FOR CONTRIBUTORS

1. Manuscripts should be submitted online via the website <http://mc.manuscriptcentral.com/ede>. Instructions can be found on the website by clicking the 'Instructions and Forms' link and then the Instructions for Contributors link. Manuscripts should be written in English. Preferred file formats are Word or pdf for the text, eps for the figures, and Excel for any graphs or charts.

2. **General guidelines** – Manuscripts should have a 12 point font, double spacing throughout, and 2.54 cm (1 inch) margins on all sides. Paragraphs should be indented, except following a section heading. The first page of the manuscript should be a **title page** containing: the name, affiliation and email address of all authors; a designated contact author and his/her complete correspondence address, including email address; and an abstract of 150 words maximum. The entire manuscript, including text, footnotes, references, tables and figures, should generally not exceed 36 pages. Additional supplementary material can be submitted in a separate file.

3. **Tables** should be numbered sequentially through the text. Tables should be placed in the text of the manuscript, where they will appear. Titles (placed above tables) and headings should be brief and descriptive. The text should include references to all tables.

4. **Figures** should be placed in the text of the manuscript, where they will appear. Quality should be high enough for **direct reproduction**, and designed to allow a reduction of 50%. Figures should be numbered sequentially through the text and each should have a caption (placed below it). References should be made in the text to each figure. The journal does not publish colour figures.

5. **References** – In the text refer to the author's name and year of publication, separated by a comma (Smith, 2003). If there are more than two authors, the name of the first author should be used followed by 'et al.' (Smith et al., 2004). If two or more references are cited together in the text, they should be arranged chronologically (Sorensen, 1997; Goring, 1999). Publications by the same author(s) in the same year should be listed as 1994a, 1994b, etc. Personal communications should be cited as e.g. '(G. McNeal, personal communication, 2006)' but not included in the list of references. Do not abbreviate the titles of periodicals.

Use the following style for references:

Journal articles: **Barbier EB** (2010) Poverty, development and environment. *Environment and Development Economics* 15(6), 635–660.

Articles in edited works: **Pizer WA and Kopp R** (2005) Calculating the costs of environmental regulation. In Mäler K-G and Vincent JR (eds). *Handbook of Environmental Economics*, vol. 3. Amsterdam: Elsevier, pp. 1308–1344.

Books: **Bradley P and Huby M** (1993) *Woodfuel, Women and Woodlots*. London: Macmillan.

Unpublished reports, departmental working papers, etc.: **Blankespoor B, Dasgupta S, Laplante B and Wheeler D** (2010) Adaptation to climate extremes in developing countries: the role of education. Policy Research Working Paper No. 5342, The World Bank, Washington, DC.

6. **Equations** should be clearly written, with the meaning of all symbols explained immediately after they are first used. Number equations serially at the right-hand side in parentheses, but only equations referred to in the text need be numbered. Greek letters and mathematical symbols should be italicised in the equations and in the text.

7. **Footnotes** should only be used when essential, and kept as short as possible. They should be numbered in superscript in the text, following any punctuation.

8. **Copyright** – Submission of an article implies that it has not been published or accepted for publication elsewhere. Authors are responsible for obtaining written permission to reproduce any material (in both print and electronic media) for which they do not own copyright, and for ensuring that the appropriate acknowledgements are included in their manuscript. Authors of published articles assign copyright to Cambridge University Press (with certain rights reserved).
