Two Academic Programs in Law and Philosophy at the University of Western Ontario. (1) There is a Special Ph.D. Program in Legal Philosophy. This program gives up to four semester courses credit towards the Ph.D. degree for having taken first year law at an accredited law school (antecedent to entering or during the program). Enrolment in the Ph.D. philosophy and law program is undertaken after completion of an M.A. and with admission to Philosophy through the Graduate Faculty UWO. (2) There is an LL.B./M.A. program. In this program law students at the University of Western Ontario may receive credit towards the LL.B. degree by taking certain philosophy courses (up to four semester courses). Enrolment in the LL.B./M.A. program is undertaken at the end of the first year of LL.B. studies; a special M.A. year in philosophy is taken after completing the LL.B. degree. Graduate students in philosophy are eligible for various forms of financial support, to a maximum of \$12,000. Application for the Ph.D. program should be made to the Director of Graduate Studies, Department of Philosophy, University of Western Ontario, London, Ontario, Canada N6A 3K7.

Manuscripts should be written in English or French and double spaced. Footnotes should be numbered consecutively on separate pages. They should conform to the *Canadian Guide To Uniform Legal Citation/Manuel canadien de la référence juridique*, 2d ed. Two copies of manuscripts are requested; these will not be returned, unless return is requested. Author(s) will receive 25 offprints without cost.
