# IN MEMORIAM

Henry Puger died in Paris on 18 November at the age of 72. He was for many years and at the time of his death chairman of the Scientific Committee of the International Institute of Administrative Sciences and the French member of its Executive Committee. Mr. Puget served in the Council of State for forty-five years. Important details were service in the cabinets of the Ministries of Finance and Air and as chairman of the Appeals Board of UNESCO. His intellectual in-

terests were wide: local government, town planning, copyright, maritime law, atomic energy. Throughout his career he taught at the Institute of Political Studies of the University of Paris. He made important contributions to comparative law and administration through his leadership in IIAS and other international organs and through his publications.
