Encouraging the Brightest: The 2000 Ralph Bunche Summer Institute

Twenty gifted undergraduate students of color from colleges across the country attended the 14th annual Ralph Bunche Summer Institute at the University of Virginia this summer in order to learn more about graduate study in political science. Sponsored jointly by the National Science Foundation, the Department of Government and Foreign Affairs at the University of Virginia, and the American Political Science Association, the Bunche Institute is designed to introduce students of color to graduate school and to encourage their application to Ph.D. programs in political science. This year's class represented schools as diverse as UCLA, St. Mary's University (TX), the University of Virginia, and Howard University.

While living on the grounds of UVA the students spent five weeks in two graduate-level courses taught by distinguished members of UVA's faculty and attended weekly lunches and dinners with visiting scholars including Rodney Hero (University of Colorado, Boulder), Gary Segura (Claremont Graduate University), Melissa Harris-Lacewell (University of Chicago), and Katherine Tate (University of California, Irvine). Other activities included a tour of Thomas Jefferson's Monticello, two trips to Washington, DC, and Graduate Record Examination preparation provided by Kaplan Testing Services. One of the highlights of the program was the day-long recruitment fair at which representatives of top political science departments met with students to discuss graduate school prospects.

Study at the Institute was intense. Monday through Thursday, the students met for four hours in either Institute Director Paula McClain's Race and American Politics course or Paul Freedman's quantitative methods course, Political Analysis. According to the students, the courses were very challenging and very rewarding. At the end of the term, each student produced original research using data sets such as the 1996 National Black Election Study and the 1993 National Black Politics Study.
