## THE GORDON WHITE PRIZE

*The China Quarterly* is pleased to award the 2022 Gordon White Prize to Hongjian Wang for her article “From Court Fools to Stage Puppets: Country Bumpkins in the Skits on CCTV’s Spring Festival Gala, 1983–2022” (No. 250, June 2022, pp. 552–571).

The £500 prize is awarded annually for the most original article or research report published in *The China Quarterly* in the relevant year.

Gordon White achieved great distinction for his analysis of modern Chinese politics and society, and for his efforts to promote teaching and research on China. He served as a member of the Editorial Board and Executive Committee of *The China Quarterly* from 1991 until his death in 1998.

The judges are drawn from among the Editorial Board. The prize-winner is published in the June issue of the journal each year.
