POSTDOCTORAL FELLOWSHIP IN BUSINESS HISTORY

\$18,500

- ¶ To be awarded for twelve-months' residence, study, teaching, and research at the Harvard Business School during 1978–1979.
- The Fellowship has two purposes. The first is to assist a recent Ph.D. graduate in history, economics, or a related discipline to improve his or her professional acquaintance with business and economic history, increase his or her skills as they relate to this field, and to engage in research that will benefit from the rich resources of Baker Library, other Harvard libraries, and the Boston-Cambridge scholarly community.
- ¶ The second purpose is to provide training in teaching. Approximately one-half of the postdoctoral year will be directed toward familiarizing the Fellow with the philosophy and practice of training managers at Harvard. The Fellow will participate as a student in the Business History course and the Business History Seminar. He or she will also be an observer of faculty teaching group preparations for one of the required MBA courses (such as Environmental Analysis for Management, Production and Operations Management, or Business Policy), and will be offered an opportunity to participate in some aspect of the work of the teaching group. The remaining one-half of the Fellow's time will be available for research in the field of Business History.
- Inquiries and requests for application forms should be addressed to Professor Alfred D. Chandler, Jr., 214 Baker Library, Harvard University Graduate School of Business Administration, Boston, Massachusetts 02163.
- The application forms ask that candidates specify their purpose in applying for the Fellowship, the required MBA course which they would like to participate in teaching, and the topic, objectives, and design of the research to be undertaken. Applications should be accompanied by graduate school records, thesis abstract, the names and addresses of three persons who will support the application, and other credentials described in the form.
- The selection committee, which will be composed of Faculty members of the Harvard Business School, will make its award to the applicant with the most outstanding potential and whose background and plans seem most likely to benefit from the resources offered. The successful applicant may begin his or her twelve-months' residence on either July 1 or September 1, 1978.
- Applications for the Postdoctoral Fellowship in Business History must be submitted before February 15, 1978. The Fellowship will be awarded and all applicants notified by March 15, 1978. Material submitted with applications will be returned only if accompanied by postage and self-addressed return envelope.


