'PHILOSOPHY' is the Journal of the Royal Institute of Philosophy and its editorial policy is therefore governed by the aims of the Institute. These aims are to promote the study of philosophy and to encourage original work in it. 'Philosophy' is understood as covering ethics, aesthetics, metaphysics, epistemology, logic, political and social philosophy, the philosophies of education, history, language, mind, religion and science. The Institute is not committed to any school or method. Neither is its membership restricted to those with specialist qualifications in philosophy. Contributors are therefore expected to present their views in as non-technical a manner as their subject-matter permits.

MEMBERSHIP. The Institute welcomes as members any who are interested in philosophy. There are centres of the Institute at the University of Newcastle-upon-Tyne, the University College of North Wales and the University of Southern California. In these centres, as well as at the Institute's headquarters, 14 Gordon Square, London, WC1H OAG, a programme of lectures is arranged each year.

The annual membership subscription to the Institute is £2. 10s. (£2.50), \$6.50 in the U.S.A. and Canada. This covers the Journal but not the volumes in the Royal Institute of Philosophy Lectures series. Membership is effective from 1st April of any year. Those joining at other times will receive any numbers of the journal which have already appeared in the relevant membership year. CONTRIBUTIONS. Articles and discussions should be submitted for the attention of the Editor, Professor H. B. Acton, at 14 Gordon Square, London, WC1H OAG. The return of contributions cannot be guaranteed unless they are accompanied by stamps, or in the case of contributions from abroad, by international coupons, to cover postage. A self-addressed envelope should also be enclosed.

Only corrections of printer's errors can be allowed in proofs. Authors are therefore asked to send any alterations or additions to Professor Acton as soon as possible after receiving his letter of acceptance.

BOOKS FOR REVIEW. These should be sent to the Assistant Editor at the Institute and not to Macmillans. Publishers are asked to note that, while careful consideration will be given to any book in the fields specified above, non-philosophical works are not reviewed in *Philosophy*.
