THE CONTRIBUTORS

ROBERT ROSSOW is a Foreign Service Officer presently assigned as an adviser on training in the Office of Personnel of the Department of State. He previously served at diplomatic and consular posts in Afghanistan, India, Nepal, Bulgaria, Iran, Panama, and Canada.

ALEXANDER GERSCHENKRON is Professor of Economics and Director of the Economic History Workshop at Harvard University. A collection of his essays, entitled *Economic Backwardness in Historical Perspective*, is in process of publication.

J. C. HUREWITZ, Professor of Government on the Graduate Faculty of Political Science, Columbia University, is the author of *Diplomacy in the Near and Middle East* (1956) and other books and articles on the Middle East.

LINCOLN P. BLOOMFIELD, who served in the State Department in a variety of capacities related to U.S. participation in international organizations, is now Director of the Arms Control Project at MIT's Center for International Studies and Associate Professor of Political Science. His publications include *The United Nations and U.S. Foreign Policy* (1960) and *Outer Space: Prospects for Man and Society* (1962), of which he is editor and co-author.

CHALMERS A. JOHNSON is Assistant Professor of Political Science at the University of California (Berkeley). He spent the academic year 1961-1962 in Japan under a grant from the Ford Foundation, completing a study of Chinese Communist affairs during the Sino-Japanese War, utilizing Japanese Army archives.

GEORGE MODELSKI is Senior Fellow in the Department of International Relations at the Australian National University, Canberra. Author of *A Theory of Foreign Policy* (1962) and editor of *SEATO: Six Studies* (1962), he is preparing a book on the international politics of Southeast Asia.

ROBERT J. AUMANN, Lecturer in the Department of Mathematics at the Hebrew University of Jerusalem, was a Research Associate of the Department of Economics at Princeton in 1960-1961.

JOHN C. HARSANYI, Professor of Economics at Wayne State University in Detroit, will be on leave in 1962-1963 to engage in research into game-theoretical bargaining models and their applications in economics and political science. He has a book in progress on this subject.

EDWARD A. TIRYAKIAN, Assistant Professor of Sociology at Princeton University and author of *Sociologism and Existentialism* (1962), traveled in Africa in 1959 and is spending this summer in French-speaking sub-Saharan African countries, preparing a sociological interpretation of the area's development.

FRED C. IKLÉ is a staff member of The RAND Corporation, presently on sabbatical leave to undertake a study of negotiation techniques. Among his publications are *The Social Impact of Bomb Destruction* (1958) and various articles in the field of disarmament.
