

## Reference Books of 1974–75: A Selection

This is the second of a series intended to identify significant reference works on Slavic and East European topics. Some of these books may also be reviewed at greater length elsewhere in this journal. As an aid to verification, Library of Congress entries and card numbers are supplied when available. Books have been examined by staff members of the Slavic and East European Division of the University of Illinois Library at Urbana-Champaign, and annotations are signed with their initials.<sup>1</sup>

### GENERAL

Birkos, Alexander S. *East European and Soviet Economic Affairs: A Bibliography (1965–1973)*. By Alexander S. Birkos and Lewis A. Tambs. Littleton, Colo.: Libraries Unlimited, Inc., 1975. 170 pp. \$10.00. LC 74-28495.

Some 1,168 articles, books, and pamphlets in English are listed without annotations in this selective bibliography. Contents of collections and symposia are not given, and the method of compilation is not explained. The extensive indexing provided seems disproportionate to the scope of the work.—LHM.

New York. Public Library. Slavonic Division. *Dictionary Catalog of the Slavonic Collection*. 2nd ed., rev. and enl. Boston: G. K. Hall, 1974. 44 vols. \$2,900.

The second edition, which supersedes the 1959 edition of approximately 550,000 cards, contains 724,000 cards and includes Roman and non-Roman alphabet language materials (Baltic and Slavic), as well as Western language materials published in 1971 or earlier. Pohrt, Heinz. *Bibliographie slawistischer Publikationen aus der Deutschen Demokratischen Republik 1968–1972, nebst Nachträgen, 1946–1967*. Berlin: Akademie-Verlag, 1974. 287 pp. ODM 25. LC 74-323238.

Updating a publication with the same title which covered 1946 to 1967, this volume contains 3,366 titles of monographs, articles, and book reviews of East German scholars pertaining to all Slavic nations and relations between Germany and the Slavic countries. The major sections include: general works, Slavic languages, literatures, folklore, history, history of science and culture, onomastics, Slavic-German relations, and reports and proceedings of conferences. There is an author-subject index of personal names.—DMS.

Polska Akademia Nauk. Zakład Słowianoznawstwa. *Słownik prasłowiański*, vol. 1. Edited by Franciszek Sławski. Cracow: Zakład Narodowy im. Ossolińskich, 1974. 487 pp. 130 zł. LC 75-582610.

This first volume of a projected ten or twelve volume work includes the

letters A and B in addition to a bibliography, discussion of methodology, and an analysis of word formation in Proto-Slavic ("Zarys słowotwórstwa prasłowiańskiego," pp. 43-141) by F. Sławski. Each lexical entry includes the reconstructed Proto-Slavic form and meaning; a definition in modern Polish (in some cases also in Latin); evidence for the reconstruction from attested forms in Slavic languages; cognates in other Indo-European language groups; and a bibliography of citations in the etymological literature relating to the reconstruction.—HL.

## HUNGARY

Harvard University. Library. *Hungarian History and Literature: Classification schedule, classified listing by call number, chronological listing, author and title listing*. Widener Library Shelflist, 44. Cambridge, Mass.: Harvard University Library; dist. by Harvard University Press, 1974. 186 pp. \$25.00. LC 72-83390.

A catalog of the history and literature sections of one of the most important Hungarian collections in North America, this volume includes 6,550 titles (both monographs and serials) in Hungarian and other languages. The Widener Library is especially strong in materials published before 1920.—HL.

## POLAND

Czachowska, Jadwiga. *Przewodnik polonisty: Bibliografie, słowniki, biblioteki, muzea literackie*. By Jadwiga Czachowska and Roman Loth. Wrocław: Zakład Narodowy im. Ossolińskich, 1974. 620 pp. 120 zł. LC 75-530689.

This is part of a series, "Vademecum polonisty," offering extensive bibliographical assistance to younger scholars

in Polish literature. Indexed by both author and subject, the work consists of an annotated list of bibliographies, several kinds of dictionaries, documentation on national and foreign literature in Poland, and materials on related disciplines such as history, philosophy, art, music, psychology, journalism, and so forth (2,275 items in all). Part 2 is a 144-page guide to research libraries and literary museums with substantial holdings. According to the introduction this book should be used in combination with *Warsztat badawczy polonisty*, to be published in the same series.—DG.

*Księga cytatów z polskiej literatury pięknej od XIV do XX wieku*. Compiled by Paweł Hertz and Władysław Kopalinski. Warsaw: Państwowe Wydawnictwo Naukowe, 1975. 907 pp. 350 zł. LC 76-511936.

Included in this work are quotations from Polish literary works of more than two hundred authors born before 1881. There are also some translations of foreign poetry made by eminent Polish authors (Kochanowski, Mickiewicz) which have become part of the national literary heritage, and anonymous poetry of the fourteenth to sixteenth centuries. The arrangement is alphabetical by author with a thematic and key word index.—DG.

## RUSSIA AND SOVIET UNION

*Bibliografia po problemam narodonase-leniia: Sovetskaia i perevodnaia literatura, 1960-1971 gg.* Edited by D. I. Valentei and E. Iu. Burnashev. Moscow: "Statistika," 1974. 342 pp. 2.59 rubles. LC 75-594019.

Prepared under the auspices of the Center for the Study of Population Problems, Faculty of Economics, Moscow University, this bibliography includes 3,299 monographs, chapters in books, journal articles, and dissertation

abstracts dealing with demography and related areas, by Soviet authors and some foreign authors whose works have been translated into Russian and published in the Soviet Union. Most of the titles are described *de visu*. Entries are not annotated. Arrangement is by subject, and there is an author index. This supersedes a 1971 work of the same title compiled by the same group and covering 1965–68.—MTC.

*Biblioteka russkoi poezii I. N. Rozanova: Bibliograficheskoe opisanie.* Compiled by V. V. Gol'dberg et al. Gosudarstvennyi muzei A. S. Pushkina. Moscow: "Kniga," 1975. 479 pp. 9.06 rubles.

The personal library of Ivan Nikanorovich Rozanov (1874–1959) is kept as a separate collection in the Pushkin Museum. It is described in this volume by 7,943 entries, nearly all in Russian and mainly concerning Russian poetry published both in Russia and abroad. Imprints date from 1730 to the late 1950s and include many rare published and unpublished materials. A full bibliographic description of each item is given, including contents notes and quotations of authors' autograph dedications. In addition to 4,438 books by individual poets, there are substantial sections for almanacs and collections, folklore, criticism, and journals. Five detailed indexes contribute to the book's reference value.—JEP.

*Handbook of Major Soviet Nationalities.* Zev Katz, ed.; Rosemarie Rogers, assoc. ed.; Frederic Harned, assist. ed. New York: Free Press, 1975. 481 pp. \$25.00. LC 74-10458.

This handbook presents surveys, in text and tabular form, of the non-Russian nationalities of the USSR. The surveys are in five groups: Slavs, Baltics, Transcaucasus, Central Asia, and other nationalities (including

Jews, Tatars, and Moldavians). Each survey includes general information on territory, economy, history, demography, culture, and external relations; discussions of media and national attitudes; and references. The volume is introduced by Richard Pipes in an essay on "The Nationality Problem," and concludes with an appendix of 29 comparative tables for the major nationalities (basic data, urban-rural distribution, national income, trade, and so forth). The index is mainly by subject.—MTC.

Harris, Chauncey Dennison. *Guide to Geographical Bibliographies and Reference Works in Russian or on the Soviet Union.* University of Chicago Department of Geography Research Paper no. 164. Chicago, 1975. 478 pp. \$5.00. LC 74-84784.

Professor Harris has compiled an annotated list of 2,660 bibliographies and reference aids. The list is divided into six main parts: general bibliographical aids; reference works and associated bibliographies; systematic fields of geography; regional geography (the Soviet Union); regional geography of areas outside the Soviet Union; and bibliographies and reference works on the Soviet Union in Western languages. The index includes authors, titles, sponsoring institutions, subjects, and places in a single alphabetical listing.—MTC.

*Istoriia russkoi filosofii: Ukazatel' literatury izdannoii v SSSR na russkom iazyke za 1917–1967 gg.* 3 vols. Compiled by I. L. Belen'kii et al. Akademiia nauk SSSR. Institut nauchnoi informatsii po obshchestvennym naukam. Moscow, 1975. 2.15 rubles. LC 75-404495.

The pre-Marxist period of Russian philosophy ("from the ninth century through 1883") is covered in this schol-

arly registrative bibliography. The 8,245 partly annotated entries for books, articles, dissertation abstracts, and parts of books are arranged topically with the last two volumes devoted almost entirely to individual literary and political figures, historians, scientists, and philosophers of the nineteenth century. Among the most extensive subjects covered are Chernyshevskii (736 entries), Tolstoy, Turgenev, Belinskii, Dobroliubov, Mendeleev, and Dostoevsky. The photo-offset format and lack of adequate indexing (only an author index) make the work difficult to use.—LHM.

*Literatura i fol'klor narodov SSSR: Ukazatel' otechestvennykh bibliograficheskikh posobii i spravocnykh izdani, 1926-1970.* Edited by S. A. Erzin and F. E. Ebin. Moscow: "Kniga," 1975. 235 pp. 1.07 rubles. LC 75-400962.

This selective and nonscholarly bibliography of bibliographies and reference works on the literature and folklore of forty-two nationalities of the Soviet Union has 719 entries for 1926-70; most imprints are 1960 or later. Russian literature is not included, since a similar guide to Russian literary bibliographies has been announced for publication in 1976. Titles from the Baltic states and Western Ukraine date from 1940. For each national literature, items are listed under the following categories: general bibliographic and reference materials on literature and folklore, including children's literature; bibliographies dealing with specific topics; and bibliographies and guides to the works of individual writers. Titles of non-Russian books are cited only in Russian. Annotations effectively describe the scope and content of each work and include citations of reviews.—JEP.

Masanov, Iurii Ivanovich. *Ukazateli*

*soderzhaniiia russkikh zhurnalov i prodolzhaiushchikhsia izdani, 1755-1970 gg.* By Iu. I. Masanov, N. V. Nikitina, and Z. D. Titova. Moscow: "Kniga," 1975. 437 pp. 1.34 rubles. LC 75-410476.

Over 2,800 cumulative indexes to Russian and Soviet periodicals and other serial publications are recorded in this bibliography. Both separately published indexes and those found in issues of periodicals are included. Indexes to this volume provide access to personal names associated with periodical indexes, subjects of individual serial titles, and corporate entities responsible for the publication of serials.—HL.

*Razvitie sovetskoj istoricheskoi nauki, 1970-1974.* Edited by E. M. Zhukov et al. Akademiia nauk SSSR. Natsional'nyi komitet istorikov Sovetskogo Soiuza. Moscow: "Nauka," 1975. 478 pp. 1.88 rubles. LC 76-506999.

This collection contains thirty-six bibliographic essays by prominent scholars surveying nearly all fields of Soviet historical and auxiliary historical research, except the history of science and technology. Some pre-1970 publications and 1975 imprints are included, and there is an author-subject index of personal names.—LHM.

Rutman, Raisa Efimovna. *Rossia v period pervoi mirovoi voiny i Fevral'skoi burzhuzno-demokraticeskoi revoliutsii (iul' 1914-fevral' 1917 g.): Bibliograficheskii ukazatel' sovetskoj literatury, izdannoj v 1953-1968 gg.* Leningrad: Biblioteka Akademii nauk SSSR, 1975. 614 pp. 1.42 rubles. LC 75-592215.

About 3,670 items are listed in this near-print publication which attempts registrative coverage of Soviet books, pamphlets, articles, parts of books, dissertation abstracts, and book reviews

(including both Soviet and foreign reviews through 1973). Ukrainian and Belorussian titles generally are listed in the original language; Latvian, Lithuanian, and Estonian in the original with Russian translation; and titles in other languages of the Soviet Union only in Russian translation. The arrangement is topical with personal name and geographical indexes and a list of collections from which articles were extracted.—LHM.

Senkevitch, Anatole. *Soviet Architecture, 1917–1962: A Bibliographical Guide to Source Material*. Charlottesville: University Press of Virginia, 1974. 284 pp. \$13.50. LC 73-75355.

Covering a field previously neglected by bibliographers, this selective guide to more than 1,000 books and articles concentrates on the history and theory of Soviet architecture, and includes little of a purely technical nature. There are Western language citations, but most of the material is in Russian and published in the USSR. English translations are given for Russian titles, and all items have annotations; references to supplementary titles are also given. The thematic arrangement includes reference works, theoretical works, histories, works about specific institutions, movements and organizations, and works by and about individual architects. The index includes authors, sponsoring organizations, and titles.—JEP.

*Slovar' russkogo iazyka XI–XVII vv.* Vol. 1: A–B. S. G. Barkhudarov, editor in chief. Akademiia nauk SSSR. Institut russkogo iazyka. Moscow: "Nauka," 1975. 371 pp. 2.83 rubles (includes separately bound list of sources). LC 75-535350.

This first volume of the dictionary covers words beginning with the Cyrillic letters A and B and contains 3,284 entries. Each entry includes the

word (in normalized form), a definition or equivalent word in modern Russian, examples of the word as used in one or more texts, and a short list of sources for further examples of the use of the word. In the companion volume (*Ukazatel' istochnikov*) of 126 pages, the full bibliographical descriptions are given for the sources cited by abbreviations in the dictionary.—HL.

Stepanov, V. P. *Zhurnal "Russkaia literatura" za 1958–1973: Ukazatel' soderzhaniia*. Leningrad: "Nauka," 1975. 175 pp. 60 kopecks.

Two thousand and twelve articles, notes, and reviews published in the journal *Russkaia literatura* from its first issue in 1958 through 1973 are indexed. Items are classified into fourteen broad classes (for example, folklore, eighteenth-century literature, Soviet literature), with further division in most classes under the authors criticized. Many items are annotated. Included is an index to personal names and specific subjects.—HL.

#### UKRAINE

Podvez'ko, Mykhailo Leontovych. *Anhlo-ukraïns'kyi slovnyk. English-Ukrainian dictionary*. By M. L. Podvez'ko and M. I. Balla. Kiev: "Radiants'ka shkola," 1974. 663 pp. 3.90 rubles. LC 75-57823.

Containing nearly 65,000 English words with their Ukrainian equivalents, this is an almost completely reworked edition and the largest of Podvez'ko's dictionaries. Additional features include idiomatic expressions, proverbs, and sayings in both languages, and listings of abbreviations, geographical names, and proper names.—DMS.

Romanenchuk, Bohdan. *Bibliohrafiia vydan' ukraïns'koï emihratsiinoi*

*literary 1945-1970. Bibliography of Ukrainian Emigre Literature, 1945-1970.* Biblioteka Ukraïns'koï knyhy, vol. 2. Philadelphia: "Kyïv," 1974. 96 pp. \$3.00. LC 75-546364.

This is the first publication of a bibliography of Ukrainian literature published outside the Ukraine from 1945 to 1970. The volume includes approximately 2,000 monographs, collections, and serial titles. It covers all literary genres, children's literature, criticism, and scholarly studies.—DMS.

Shtohryn, Dmytro M., ed. *Ukrainians in North America: A Biographical Directory of Noteworthy Men and Women of Ukrainian Origin in the United States and Canada.* Champaign, Ill.: Association for the Advancement of Ukrainian Studies, 1975. 424 pp. \$27.50. LC 75-31726.

Biographies of nearly 2,000 prominent living persons and those who have made significant contributions to the life of Ukrainian communities in North America are included. Thirty-five persons who died during preparation of the work (1973-75) are treated in a separate section. Bibliographies for the individuals generally are limited to four books and four periodical titles to which they contributed. An appendix has two alphabetical lists: the biographees living in the United States; and those living in Canada.—LHM.

#### YUGOSLAVIA

Buļovec, Štefka. *Prešernova bibliografija.* Maribor: Založba Obzorja, 1975. 759 pp.

This 6,574-item bibliography of Prešeren includes the manuscripts and published editions of his works, translations, biography, and criticism of his works; and sections on musical settings of Prešeren's poems and Prešeren in literature. The compiler attempted to identify and include all books and articles published before 1970. Indexing provides access to authors, subjects, individual poems, and manuscripts.—HL.

Kukuljević-Sakcinski, Ivan. *Bibliografija hrvatska.* Vol. 1: Tiskane knjige. Ljubljana: Cankarjeva založba, 1974 [Zagreb: D. Albrecht, 1860]. 233 pp. LC 75-970066.

This is a reprint of the first general retrospective Croatian bibliography. See the annotation of the original edition in Horecky, *Southeastern Europe*, item 2097.—DC.

Popović, Gordana. *Ivo Andrić: Bibliografija dela, prevoda i literatura.* Belgrade: Srpska akademija nauka i umetnosti, Biblioteka, 1974. 330 pp. LC 75-970205.

This bibliography contains entries for all works written and translated by Andrić, translations of his works, and Andrić criticism. It is arranged chronologically within each section and includes 2,538 items published up to 1971. There is an index of titles, translated titles, titles of critical works, and authors.—DC.
