1983-84 Progress Report of the APSA Policy Studies Section

During the 1983-84 academic year, the Policy Studies Section of the American Political Science Association engaged in the following activities generally together with the Policy Studies Organization.

- The Policy Studies Section officially came into existence as of the 1983 APSA meeting.
 Over 100 members of the American Political Science Association indicated a desire to see a Policy Studies Section.
- Since the establishment of the Section in August, 1983, the Section has grown to 289 members as of June 30, 1984. The Section will probably grow substantially larger since there are many APSA members who have not yet received their membership renewal letters, which will inform them of the existence of the Section.
- 3. An important activity of the Section has been aiding in the development of a set of panels, workshops, and other events for the 1984 APSA convention. There will be seven workshops under the auspices of the Policy Studies Section. The subject of those panels are: (1) national service and public policy; (2) productivity, public policy, and societal wellbeing; (3) public policy, Canada, and the

United States; (4) intergovernmental relations and public policy; (5) industrial policy; (6) families, children, and public policy; and (7) emerging patterns in illegal immigration. These workshops are partly designed to develop publishable symposia by bringing together participating authors and others.

- 4. These workshops are in addition to the regular policy studies *panels* of the APSA Program Committee. The Section invites appropriate members of the Program Committee to the Section's annual meeting to present and discuss their ideas for next year's panels.
- 5. The Section will be participating in the sponsorship of the Policy Studies Awards Luncheon on September 1 at the APSA convention. The awards to be given include: (1) the Harold Lasswell Award to an outstanding scholar contributing to our understanding of the substance or process of public policy; (2) the Hubert Humphrey Award to an outstanding public policy practitioner; (3) the Donald Campbell Award to an outstanding methodlogical innovator in public policy studies; (4) the award for the best policy studies book published in the past year; (5) the award for the best policy studies paper presented at the annual meeting of the Midwest Political Science Association which may be expanded to include other associations: (6) the award for the best article in the Policy Studies Review which may be expanded to include the Policy
