Compiled for the Bechuanaland Protectorate Administration, this book is one of the fullest studies yet made of the traditional and modern laws and related customs of any group of Bantu tribes in Southern Africa. The author, who is Professor of Social Anthropology in the University of Capetown, spent several years in the field collecting his material, working throughout with the fullest co-operation from the Native tribal authorities and the officials of the Administration. His book may be regarded as the authoritative exposition of Tswana government and law.
