NEW PREPARATIONS.

The Adhesive Electrode.

They adhere to the surface of the skin, and conduct a very even current. Their internal resistance, after experiment, is proved to be very much less than that of electrodes now in use. They can be made of any size, even so as to entirely supplant the cumbersome clay electrodes employed in abdominal electricity. With strong currents even, no blistering of the surface results. There is no doubt that these electrodes fill a much felt want in electro-therapeutics, and their great value has already been recognized by eminent physiologists and electricians in this country. We believe that they are obtained in standard sizes, so that uniformity of experiments may be secured. They are cheap, and decidedly preferable to any other kind of electrode.
