### The First Book on the Unknown War in Poland 1944-1952

Zbrodnia czy poczatek wojny domowej, focuses on the issue of whether the killing by the Narowowe Sily Zbrojne detachment of 26 previously disarmed soldiers of the Communist Gwardia Ludowa of the Polska Partia Robotnicza (Polish Worker's Party) on August 5, 1943 was simply a mass murder or rather the beginning of a Polish civil war in German-occupied Poland. The discussion and analysis of this question is based upon the contemporary Polish penal law, criminal procedure and the international agreements known as the Hague and Geneva Conventions.

Careful and modest counting shows that between July of 1944 and December of 1952, the date of the dissolution of the last clandestine country-wide organization named *Wolnosc i Niezawislosc* (Freedom and Sovereignty"), about three million organized Poles resisted politically (as a legal opposition and as underground organizations) and with arms to a Soviet exported tyranny calling itself *Polska Ludowa* (People's Poland). About a million Poles were arrested and put into "labor" camps and prisons located in Poland and the Soviet Union. About another million Poles were arrested and forcibly deported to the Soviet Union or resettled within Poland.

This volume, a supplement to RUSSIA, THE USSR, AND EASTERN EUROPE: A BIBLIOGRAPHIC GUIDE TO ENGLISH LANGUAGE PUBLICATIONS, 1964-1974 (Libraries Unlimited, 1978, o.p.), extends its listings to cover the years 1975-1980. Some 1,000 monographs, most written in English, are included here. A few extremely important foreign language titles are also listed. The annotations for these works are derived from published reviews and offer critical commentary, summaries of contents, and the title's special contributions to specific fields. Full citations to the published reviews are also provided.

The general subject arrangement and format of this work are patterned after the 1964-1974 volume. Part one covers "General and Interrelated Themes," such as general reference works, economics, government and law, and international relations; part two includes the "Russian Empire prior to 1917 and USSR: Non-Russian Republics; and Jews"; and part three, "Eastern Europe," offers works in general studies and on individual countries.

College and university libraries, large public libraries, and instructors and students of Soviet and East European studies will find this comprehensive, annotated bibliography a most valuable resource.
