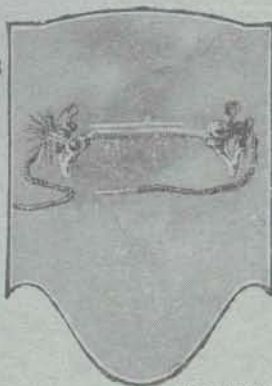

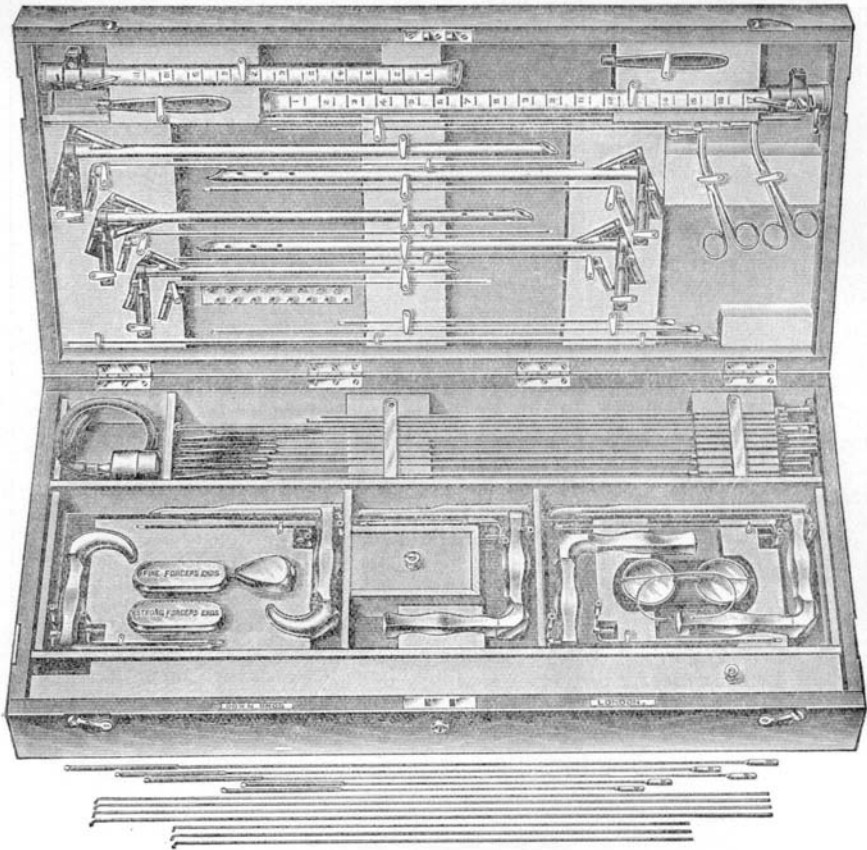

The Hospital, which has for some considerable time been undergoing very extensive reconstruction and extension, has nearly 80 beds for In-patients and an annual Out-patient attendance of over 60,000.

CLINICAL INSTRUCTION

Clinical Instruction in the Diagnosis and Treatment of Diseases of the Ear, Nose and Throat is daily given in the Out-patient Department from 2 to 5 p.m. On Tuesdays and Fridays from 6.30 to 9 p.m. also. Major operations are performed daily, except Mondays and Saturdays, in the In-patient Operating Theatres. Minor operations are performed in the Out-patient Department by the Assistant Surgeons on four mornings a week.

Practitioners and Medical Students are admitted to the practice of the hospital and Clinical Assistants, whose duty it is to assist the staff, are appointed from time to time among them. For further information apply to the Dean, GILBERT CHUBB.
