Three Great Systems *of* Jurisprudence

K. KAHANA KAGAN

Jurisprudential work has been carried on, in the past, by two main groups: those who hold that solutions are to be found in the study of metaphysical concepts and the other school who build their theories solely on the basis of social utility. Until modern times there seemed to be no common ground between the two conflicting schools of thought. In our time a desire for unification has set in. Those who are primarily concerned with the aim of establishing a peaceful and orderly existence are also anxious to base law on high ideals and to take into account the conclusions of the more abstract thinkers. There is, in fact, much criticism of the law and a call for its improvement. The author has drawn attention to a new line of investigation by which the problem of combining certainty with the capacity for growth and development can be found, thereby satisfying modern jurisprudential desires.
