**ANNOUNCEMENT****A COMPREHENSIVE ANNOTATED BIBLIOGRAPHY ON THE ECONOMIC HISTORY OF INDIA (1500 A.D. TO 1947 A.D.)**

The Gokhale Institute of Politics and Economics, Poona, has undertaken the preparation of a comprehensive annotated bibliography on the above subject, with the financial assistance from the Indian Council of Social Science Research. The bibliography will cover all source material available in English language in printed and typescript form, as well as research work done in the various branches in Indian economic history covering the period 1500 A.D. to 1947 A.D. Historical statistics will receive special consideration.

At present, exhaustive check-lists of various types of works, such as books, periodical articles, theses, parliamentary papers, serials, committee reports, etc., are under preparation. The work of preparing annotation cards is also proceeding simultaneously. Supply of copies of check-lists and annotation cards to interested research institutions is under consideration.
