## TRANSPORT AND ECONOMY

**The Turnpike Roads of Eighteenth Century Britain**

By ERIC PAWSON

The aim of this book is to contribute towards a greater understanding of the interrelationship between transport and economy. It focuses on the turnpike trusts and the turnpike road system of eighteenth century Britain, and in so doing, attempts to further the understanding of the Industrial Revolution in Britain. The book utilizes simple theoretical concepts derived from economic history and geography, especially those based on innovation and diffusion studies, in that it examines not only temporal and spatial patterns and processes, but also the context and the impact of the innovation. It differs radically in its methodological approach from previous and more traditional studies of the turnpike system by concentrating on the geographical aspects of transport and economic change rather than administrative history.

Unfinished at his death, this sequel to *The Great Transformation* represents the culmination of Polanyi's research and thinking. It exposes the myopia of our age's "market mentality," and develops a broader conceptual scheme that permits us to understand the economies of non-market ordered societies. The book focuses on trade, money, and exchange institutions in primitive and early state non-market societies, especially ancient Athens. It describes the ways in which social, political, and cultural institutions—rather than the market—ordered the economic processes of these societies, thereby giving much-needed alternatives to the rule of the market in present Western societies.

# Commercialism and Frontier

## Perspectives on the Early Shenandoah Valley

By Robert D. Mitchell

Robert Mitchell's inquiry revises many traditional views of the American frontier. Instead of depicting places of reduced simplicity, as postulated by Turnerians, it argues that a commercial continuum in economic life existed from the beginnings of pioneer settlement and became increasingly more pronounced as the nation developed. Mitchell closely examines the European transformation of the agriculturally rich Shenandoah Valley of Virginia. He analyzes the commercial motivation and activities of the early settlers and their descendants and, in particular, stresses the significance of the region within the broader context of early American westward expansion.

## Immigrants in Industrial America, 1850-1920

Edited by Richard L. Ehrlich

This collection of ten essays reflects new directions in interpreting American social history. From various perspectives the authors counter the renowned "melting pot" thesis by rejecting the notion that industrial America was overwhelmingly disorienting and destructive of ethnic traditions. They assert that immigrants who flocked to the United States during the industrial boom brought with them highly resilient cultures which were able to survive the new environment. The immigrants of such cities as Philadelphia, New York, and Jersey City are portrayed not as passive agents upon whom an alien culture was quickly imposed but rather as individuals able to maintain their customs and, to some extent, influence the institutions of American society.
