DIRECTIONS FOR *ILWCH* CONTRIBUTORS: An original and two copies of manuscripts are requested. Except for quotations, manuscripts must be in English. All manuscripts must be typed on one side of the sheet only, on 8½" x 11" nonerasable bond paper, with ample margins. *All* material—including notes, quotations, bibliographies, tables, and appendixes—must be double-spaced. Notes should be grouped together at end of manuscript and should conform to models in the *Chicago Manual of Style*, 13th ed. Maximum length of manuscripts: scholarly controversies, 35 pages including notes; substantive articles, 35 pages including notes; controversy critiques, 10 pages; review essays, 25 pages including notes; book reviews, 6 pages; reports, 6 pages; letters to the Editor, 3 pages. Address manuscripts, correspondence, and books for review to Editor, *ILWCH*, Department of History, Hall of Graduate Studies, Yale University, New Haven, CT 06520.
