

Dr. Gordon Winocur has been appointed to the position of Scientific Director of the Alzheimer Society of Canada. Dr. Winocur will be responsible for enhancing the ongoing development of the Society's dynamic research program and providing the Society with strong scientific leadership.

Dr. Winocur is a senior scientist at the Rotman Research Institute, Baycrest Centre for Geriatric Care as well as a professor of psychology at Trent University and professor of psychology and psychiatry at the University of Toronto.
