AGLANCE at the contents of this first issue of The Far Eastern Quarterly will, we believe, quickly disclose to those already acquainted with what is being published in the field of Far Eastern affairs that the Quarterly fills a gap existing between journals dealing with contemporaneous opinions and events, and the more specialized professional and academic publications.

Our aim in launching the QUARTERLY is two-fold. Furthermore, we urge that our potential contributors bear in mind the needs of the general reader and in the presentation of the results of their studies provide such background and interpretative material as is necessary to disclose the significance of their contribution in relation to the broader fields of which it is a part. From our readers in turn we solicit suggestions as to how to make the Quarterly more useful to them.

The QUARTERLY is being launched without the aid of an endowment, nor is it wholly underwritten by any one institution. Several educational institutions and a number of individuals have together provided sufficient funds to see it through its first trying year of publication. Thereafter it will have to make its way primarily through the financial support of its regular subscribers. We urge, therefore, that all readers who find the QUARTERLY of interest and value contribute materially to its support by way of an immediate subscription.
