The normal length of manuscripts published is 8,000–11,000 words. Since manuscripts are evaluated anonymously they should not bear the author's name or institutional affiliation. Please remove all references or acknowledgments that might indicate the identity of the author. Submissions should be sent with an ABSTRACT of 100–150 words.
