Phrenology and the Organization of Consent in Nineteenth-Century Britain

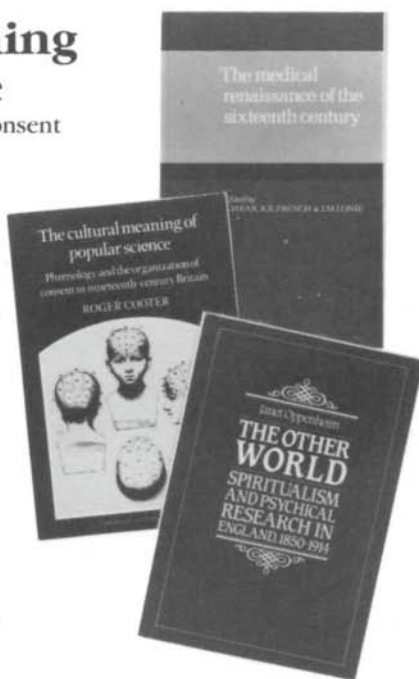
