

think what mattered most to us was that as many members of the Association as possible might be able to reach out and touch some sitting member of the Council, so that suggestions, or opinions, or grievances from as broad a population of members as possible might reach the Council and inform their deliberations. So we hope you will read our selections for this year's nominees in the context of the full Council of which they will be a part. Among the characteristics of nominees that we thought important were these: diversity of geographic location, of subfield, of personal attributes such as age, gender and race, of job characteristics such as teaching versus non-teaching, and if teaching, whether in public or private, secular or religious, large or small, rural or urban settings. All these varied characteristics of our members signal a variety of life experiences and concerns that, in some way or another, we wanted to respond to in the nomination process and express in our eventual choices. We are conscious of the fact

that the shortcomings of our efforts can be and no doubt will be compensated for by the work of our successor committee next year.

(3) In spite of our inability to maximize with equal effectiveness in all directions, we are delighted with the group of nominees that we finally selected. The enthusiasm that many of them have expressed at the prospect that they might serve our Association was very heartening indeed to the committee. That so many talented political scientists are willing to serve is a wonderful sign of the health of our collective enterprise.

APSA Updates Guide to Graduate Study and Internship Guide

The 1986 *Guide to Graduate Study in Political Science* is available. Over 300 Ph.D. and Masters programs in political science and related fields in U.S. and Canadian schools are included. The description of each program includes information about specialization(s), tuition charges and financial aid, admission and degree requirements. Faculty members are listed for each program with their highest degree and fields of specialization. The *Guide* has a faculty and geographical index, as well as data on number of degrees awarded and affirmative action efforts. The price is \$15 for APSA members and \$20 for nonmembers.

Originally published in 1977, Storming Washington: An Intern's Guide to National Government by Stephen Frantzich is now in its second edition. Finding an internship and making the most out of the internship experience are discussed. Advice is also given to instructors on credit format and research assignments. APSA Selects Black American and Chicano/Latino Fellows

Fifteen students of political science have been named APSA Fellows for 1986-87. Twelve black American and three Chicano and Latino Fellows were selected by members of the APSA Committee on the Status of Blacks and the Committee on the Status of Chicanos, respectively. Four Fellows will receive stipends while the others will receive an honorary fellowship in recognition of their past record and unusual promise for graduate study.
