# The APSA Centennial Center for Political Science and Public Affairs



The **Centennial Center for Political Science and Public Affairs** offers thirteen different grants to assist APSA members with the costs of research, including travel, interviews, access to archives, or costs for a research assistant. Funds can also be used to assist scholars in publishing their research.

These include grant opportunities to support traditional research, and to support larger projects, including collaborations to produce innovative teaching materials, research partnerships between practitioners and academic experts on pressing public issues, and community-oriented programs aimed at enhancing civic engagement and efficacy.

## WINTER GRANT CYCLE

### Growing Democracy Grants

Eligibility: Faculty from community colleges, liberal arts colleges, comprehensive and research universities that aim to strengthen ties to their communities and advance civic engagement and political efficacy  
Awards up to \$6,000  
*Applications due: January 5, 2022*

### Research Partnerships on Critical Issues Program

Eligibility: A collaborative team of at least four academic and four applied team members (eight total) with at least two academic team members who are political scientists  
Awards up to \$10,000  
*Applications due: January 5, 2022*

### Peer to Peer Pedagogical Partnerships Grants Program

Eligibility: A team of political science faculty from different institutions in the same geographic area. The teams must include one PI from a community college and one organizer from a research-intensive institution  
Awards up to \$15,000  
*Applications due: January 5, 2022*

## SPRING & SUMMER

### Spring Centennial Center Research Grants

Eligibility: APSA members in departments that do not grant PhDs, and/or who are contingent faculty.  
Awards up to \$2,500  
*Applications due: April 15, 2022*

### Summer Centennial Center Research Grants

Eligibility: All APSA members, including faculty, graduate students, and undergraduate students  
Awards from 2,500 to 10,000  
*Applications due: June 15, 2022*
