FROM THE EDITORS

Glenn D. Hogan, 1934–82

All those who find pleasure in handsome and accurate scholarly printing, and readers of *Central European History* in particular, suffered a grievous loss in the sudden death on April 6, 1982, of Glenn D. Hogan. He died in Madrid, Spain, while on vacation from his job as designer and chief editor at The Stinehour Press, Lunenburg, Vermont, where he had worked since 1970. He was born in St. Petersburg, Florida, on October 17, 1934, and educated at Sarasota High School, Springhill College in Mobile, Alabama, and Brandeis University. He was President of the Lunenburg Historical Society, and a member of Mensa, of the St. Johnsbury Great Books group, and of the American Society of Scholarly Editors.

For years, Glenn was the invisible partner in editing *CEH*—adding up columns in statistical tables to locate a typographical error, finding a slight discrepancy in the citation of a German periodical in footnotes twenty pages apart, querying a grammatical error in a Latin quotation. He cared about—and took care about—every aspect of the journal, from paper stock to typography, from footnote form to literary style. It will be a challenge to try to hold to his standard.
