## THE CONTRIBUTORS

KEITH PAVITT is Senior Research Fellow in the Science Policy Research Unit at the University of Sussex, England. He has been a staff member of the Directorate for Scientific Affairs at the OECD. Recent publications include *The Conditions for Success in Technological Innovation* (1971), and a number of papers on problems of European technological cooperation.

HOWARD J. WIARDA is Associate Professor of Political Science at the University of Massachusetts. He is the author of *Dictatorship and Development: The Methods of Control in Trujillo's Dominican Republic* (1968), *Dominican Republic: Nation in Transition* (1969), *The Brazilian Catholic Labor Movement* (1970), and a forthcoming study of political development in the Iberic-Latin tradition.

LYNN KRIEGER MYTELKA is Assistant Professor at the School of International Affairs, Carleton University, Ottawa, and Research Associate at the Institut de Coopération Internationale de l'Université d'Ottawa. She is the author of the forthcoming book, *Decisionmaking in an African Common Market: The Union douanière et économique de l'Afrique centrale*. Her current project concerns political leadership and public policy in Africa.

EDWARD FEIT is Associate Professor of Political Science at the University of Massachusetts in Amherst. His latest book, *The Armed Bureaucrats: Military Administrative Regimes and Political Development*, is about to be published.
