# Bolsheviks in the Ukraine

The Second Campaign, 1918-1919

## by Arthur E. Adams

Here is an exhaustive, but excitingly written, examination of one of the most complex periods of Soviet history. Mr. Adams deals specifically with the successes and failures of the Bolsheviks in trying to build an administrative system and an army in the Ukraine during the catastrophic days of 1918-1919. Believing that much of recent writing on Soviet history overemphasizes the roles played by Lenin, Trotsky, and Stalin and their common ideology, Mr. Adams emphasizes the social forces at work and the immense influence of the bold fighters, perplexed or angry peasants, honest nationalists, and always suffering human beings who were involved. Cited for its "painstaking scholarship" and "vivid descriptive style," this book has received the Borden Award, an annual prize for an original and scholarly work based extensively on documentary sources of the Hoover Institution. \$8.75

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
