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This is a reorganized format of the *Journal of Southeast Asian History*. Since the latter's appearance in 1960, it has developed into a publication of international stature, providing an outlet for scholarly contributions on the history of the region. More recently, the Journal has also published articles from allied disciplines, especially the social sciences, in the belief that multi-disciplinary approaches will deepen and enrich our understanding of Southeast Asia. In changing the title to the *Journal of Southeast Asian Studies*, this new orientation is given formal recognition.

The main emphasis of this publication is on the peoples and governments of Southeast Asia: how societies, cultures and institutions have evolved in the past and are evolving in the present; how indigenous forces have interacted with exogenous elements in shaping developmental patterns; how East and West are contending to determine the destinies of nations in the region; how the conflicts between the traditional and modernizing forces are being resolved; and how the problems of economic development are being solved.

The editorial policy of the Journal avoids commitment to any ideology, view point, or interpretation, which are solely the responsibilities of the contributors.

CONTRIBUTIONS

Contributions are invited from all scholars, and especially those working in Southeast Asian universities and research institutions. The average length of articles should preferably be between 4,000 and 8,000 words. Progress reports on research projects, notes on recent conferences, and comments on institutions devoted to Southeast Asian studies are also welcomed. All contributions should be typewritten or mimeographed, with double spacing, and should be submitted in duplicate.
