A conscientious teacher of non-Western history finds his class discussing *Death of a Princess*. What is Saudi Arabia really like? Conscientiously, he applies to his media center, which orders a documentary for him. 1980: Good! This is new. NBC: Should be reliable. Although he may sense the tone—Let's laugh at the oddballs, marvel at the exotic, preen ourselves from our pedestal of cultural and technological superiority, pity the backward and primitive people—he is probably unaware of the factual errors, stereotypes promoted, misleading implications, blatant omissions and offensiveness of this production, which ill-serves curious students. Between the patronizing and ethnocentric introduction: 'We know them so little ... Now they wield power through oil,'' to the final inanity: 'The great fear is that modernization will turn what was a desert culture into a cultural desert,'' a patronizing commentary accompanies a series of stereotypes and distortions.

Saudi Arabia has its problems, to be sure. The leaders are striving to cope with the impact of Westernization, picking and choosing what they deem helpful, yet cognizant of their own proud traditions and values. This insensitive, inaccurate and distorting NBC piece does not recognize this. Order another film for classroom use.

NEWS OF OTHER ASSOCIATIONS AND ANNOUNCEMENTS

Aga Khan Program for Islamic Architecture Harvard University/Massachusetts Institute of Technology

An endowment supports the Documentation Centers established at Harvard and MIT, which are collecting printed and visual materials on Islamic art, architecture and urbanism to improve the flow of information on those subjects to the academic community and to professionals. The Documentation Centers are involved not only in the acquisition of library materials, but in such activities as surveying and photographing buildings and sites, and establishing contacts with complementary collections of photographs and documents in other institutions. Both centers welcome opportunities for exchanges and other cooperative arrangements with libraries in the Islamic countries, and with other organizations specializing in architecture in the Islamic world.

Five-year funds have also been made available to the Documentation Centers to find methods for storing, indexing, retrieving and disseminating data suitable for a computerized information service on Islamic art and architecture that can be used by scholars, teachers, researchers and practitioners interested in the study of Islamic architecture and in the contemporary built environment of the Islamic world. Some of the five-year funds have been allocated to research projects, but the only kinds of projects the Program will normally fund through outside application in 1982 are those that will encourage the rapid publication and dissemination of research already completed.
