ASIAN POLITICAL SYSTEMS: Readings on China, Japan, India and Pakistan

Edited by Betty B. Burch, Tufts University; and Allan B. Cole, The Fletcher School of Law and Diplomacy, Tufts University. Available Spring, 1968.

These selected readings are for undergraduate and graduate students of Asian politics and comparative politics in general. Each country is treated separately, but there is a common analytical framework which includes political culture, leaders and ideologies, political parties, political institutions, and political processes. A unique feature is that the selections are drawn exclusively from writers native to each country and topics are covered by authors examining their own political processes rather than by Western writers analyzing an alien culture.

THE ESSENCE OF CHINESE CIVILIZATION

Edited by Dun J. Li, Paterson State College (New Jersey) 1967, 496 pages, \$4.95 (paper) and \$7.95 (cloth).

This volume of translations spans the broad perspective of the Chinese cultural system for a period of 3,000 years. To show "traditional China as it was," Professor Li has divided the material into four main topics: Philosophy and Religion; Government; Economics; and Family and Society. Each division contains anecdotes, sketches, casual observations, and personal letters as well as traditional materials from the Confucian classics and the dynastic histories.

CHINA: Ageless Land and Countless People

Chiao-min Hsieh, The Catholic University of America. 1967, 106 pages, \$1.75 (paper).

Seeking to appraise and interpret the current politico-geographic scene as an important aspect in the long history of this country, the author evaluates China's world position, her boundaries and basic physical characteristics. He also views the rise and fall of her dynasties, her unlimited manpower, and her ancient culture. The result is an informative discussion of China's emergence into the modern world.

CHINA: Emerging World Power

Victor P. Petrov, Shippensburg State College. 1967, 138 pages, \$1.75 (paper).

The author, a long-time resident and student of China, explores the complex question of China's industrial capabilities within the framework of her general economic development and relates this capability to her potential as a super world power.
