HISTORY OF ECONOMICS SOCIETY CONFERENCE

The sixth annual History of Economics Society Conference will be held at the University of Illinois, Urbana-Champaign, on 24-26 May, 1979. Persons wishing to present papers at this conference are invited to submit abstracts (two copies) together with *separate* sheets containing the following information: 1) Author's name, address, professional affiliation, position and telephone number. 2) Title of paper. 3) Whether or not the author is a member of the Society. Abstracts, together with information sheets attached, must be received no later than October 1, 1978.

It is expected that sessions will be held on some or all of the following themes, but proposals need not be confined to these areas:

1. The Time Concept in the History of Thought: Capital and Interest.
2. The Time Concept in the History of Thought: Statics and Dynamics.
3. Policy Studies in the History of Economics.
4. On Some Neglected American Economists.
5. The History of Sub-Disciplines in Economics.
5. The Rise and Fall of Business Cycle Theory.
7. Philosophic Influences on Economics: The Philosopher-Economists.

A person wishing to serve as a discussant should submit name, address, professional affiliation, position, telephone number and area of interest within the history of economics by October 1, 1978.

INSTITUTE OF INTERNATIONAL PUBLIC LAW AND INTERNATIONAL
RELATIONS, THESSALONIKI, GREECE

The 1978 Session will consist of courses and seminars on "The Peace Movement and the Humanitarian Law." The Session will be conducted at the University of Thessaloniki from August 28 to September 17. It is designed to benefit civil servants; high officers and officials of international organizations; diplomats and diplomatic missions; banks; judges; lawyers; professors of Law Schools and Schools of Political and Economic Science; advanced students and post-graduates in Law and Political, Social and Economic Science; and other persons having a particular interest in international law and international relations.

Eminent professors of international law and high officials of international organizations are cooperating and a limited number of scholarships is available. Visits to places of archeological interest have been scheduled every weekend. The Institute has arranged for 200 single rooms in the university dormitories (Fititiki Estia) to be made available at 300 drachmae per day, taxes included. The Secretariat of the Institute will make all necessary arrangements for accommodation. All registration forms should be sent by 15th July 1978 at the latest.

The lecture courses will include (among others): W. Kewenig (W. Germany) on "The Law of War as part of humanitarian law—new developments and new questions" (August 28-September 2); M. Lachs (Poland) on "The International Law of Peace" (August 28-September 2); and E. McWhinney (Canada) on "International Peace and Peace-Keeping in the Post-Detente Era" (August 28-September 2).

THE HAROLD INNIS FOUNDATION

The Harold Innis Foundation was established in 1969 to develop and maintain Innisfree Farm, the birthplace of Harold Innis, as a rural conference center, and to foster inquiry into and research on the work of Innis. The Directors of the Foundation are establishing a clearing house for studies relating to Harold Innis and his work. To this end the Directors are soliciting 1) names of scholars interested in the work of Innis, and 2) copies of or references to any material, completed or in progress, related to Innis' work. They are concerned with the full scope of Innis' interest in Canadian economic history, political economy, and the history of communications.
