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Chautauqua-Type Short Course Program

There are positions for political science faculty in a political science short course included in the NSF 1977-1978 Chautauqua-Type Short Course Program, conducted by the American Association for the Advancement of Science.

The primary objective of the program is to make available to college teachers, as quickly as possible, new knowledge about topics of current interest in such a way that the course materials will be directly useful in their teaching and research. Two political science courses have been offered annually since 1973-1974. The course materials and instructors have been evaluated as very effective by the participants.

The short courses are taught on regional circuits located at universities and colleges. Each course meets twice in two-day sessions, once in late fall and again in early spring. During the interim period participants work on projects related to the courses. The National Science Foundation provides participants with support for room rent, on a double occupancy basis, for the course periods. Participants or their institutions bear travel and meal expenses.


