



Boundary Stone or Kudurru, recording the sale of certain corn-lands in Babylonia. The inscription begins: "The name of this memorial stone is 'Establisher of the Boundary for ever." The purchase-price was reckoned in shekels of silver, actual payment, however, being by barter to the agreed value. The sculpture represents a Babylonian King wearing a richly embroidered robe, from a portion of which is copied the design here shown. Date, circa 1117-1105 B.C.
