The annual institutional subscription rate for the Journal (including the Bibliography of Asian Studies) is \$40, postage included. Single issues of the Journal are available to institutions for \$10; single issues of the Bibliography, for \$20. Single issues of the Journal and Bibliography are available to non-members for \$10 each. Orders should be addressed to the Association for Asian Studies Secretariat. Issues published prior to February 1966 may be purchased from A.M.S. Reprints, 56 E. 13th Street, New York 10003.

Membership in the Association for Asian Studies, a scholarly, non-political and non-profit organization, is open to all persons interested in Asia and the scholarly study of Asia. Manuscripts, including footnotes, should not be more than approximately 35 pages in length; the original and two clear copies should be submitted.
