EDITORIAL NOTE

This Index, like its two predecessors, is based on a collation of the annual indexes issued with each of the volumes concerned. These have varied in their length and fullness, and show inconsistencies one from another in form of entries, layout, and in the use of general headings. An attempt has been made to introduce more consistency, and to add to the usefulness of the Index with more cross-references and general headings, but the editors must once again admit that the result has its shortcomings and imperfections.

This time there is no Greek Index (but one or two Greek expressions appear in the Index of Names and Subjects), nor an Index of Coins. It was found that very few references to coins had been separately collected by indexers over the past twenty years. The important discussions will be found under Coins, Coinage, in the Index of Names and Subjects, and the enquirer is further referred to J. R. Jones, Numismatic Index to the Journal of Roman Studies, 1911-1966.

The Index was put together by Mrs. Ursula Hall with much help and advice from Mr. M. W. Frederiksen. Galley-proofs were also read by the following: Dr. J. Briscoe, Mrs. Gillian Clarke, Mr. M. H. Crawford, Professor M. Hassall, Dr. E. D. Hunt, Dr. F. G. B. Millar, Professor J. J. Wilkes and Dr. D. Wilson. Each of them checked references for two volumes of the Journal, and the Editorial Committee is most appreciative of their work. Dr. Wilson is particularly to be thanked for help over the entries relating to Roman Britain.

The following Notes on the various parts of the Index may prove useful.

- I. Index of Contributors. This gives under each contributor titles of articles, listed in order of appearance, and of Review-discussions, listed alphabetically according to the authors of the works reviewed.
- II. Index of Works Reviewed. Works marked with an asterisk are the subject of a Review-discussion. Editions and Commentaries are included under the names of both ancient author and modern editor.
- III. Index of Names and Subjects. In general, historical personages are indexed under their nomina, but literary figures and members of the Imperial family under the anglicized forms of their names. Sites are given in their modern forms, to which is generally added, as seemed suitable in the different cases, an ancient name (usually of a province) or a modern one (of country or county), to assist identification. The annual Reports on Roman Britain were always fully indexed, and references for certain clear and unmistakable categories of buildings and objects (e.g. villa, silver) have been collected together, but some references may have escaped the original indexers, and it has not proved possible to provide comprehensive entries for pottery types, even for samian. (The principal discussions will be found entered under Pottery.) It should also be noted that under some major sites there are general references to excavations and their results; for the details the volume in question must be consulted.
- IV, V, VI. The reader is reminded that these indexes do not include all passages and documents mentioned by contributors; they are meant to direct attention to new pieces of evidence or to a new use of known material. In the case of V and VI, contributors have cited from different collections, and there will remain some inconsistencies, duplication of references, omission of others which might have been expected, and so on. (If an inscription is not found under its ILS number, for example, its CIL reference should be looked up.)
- V. Index of Inscriptions. Unless otherwise indicated, references here are to numbers where standard collections are concerned, to pages in the case of journals and historical works.
