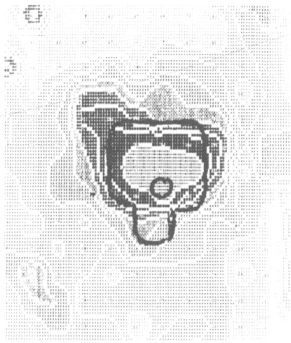

CALL FOR PROPOSALS, THIRD VOLUME

The second volume of the *SAA Papers Series* is in preparation. *Desert Varnish: Man and Environment in the Great Basin* is edited by David B. Madsen and James F. O'Connell and will be published in September 1981. The Special Publications Committee is now receiving proposals for the third volume, which should appear in September 1982.

The Special Publications Committee consists of Dr. Barbara Voorhies, Coordinator, Dr. Bruce G. Trigger, Dr. Christopher S. Peebles, and Dr. Dena F. Dincauze, *ex officio*. Proposals and inquiries should be addressed to Dr. Voorhies at the Department of Anthropology, University of California, Santa Barbara, CA 93106.

The Committee is interested in proposals for either edited collections of papers on a topic of general interest or individually authored monographs with a potentially wide audience.

Minimally, proposals should include (1) an outline of the volume with 500 word abstracts of the papers or manuscripts themselves, or a detailed synopsis of a monograph, (2) a short (4–5) page statement by the volume editor establishing the relevance of the topic, and (3) documentation in the form of vita or equivalent, demonstrating the proposed editor's ability to function in that role, and his/her access to the necessary support (staff and facilities, as required).

In order to meet the April publication schedule, proposals for volume III must be in the hands of the committee by March 15, 1981, at the latest, and the manuscript must be complete enough to go into the editing process shortly thereafter.
