Card Index of the Leadership Elite of the **People's Republic of China**

It is impossible to understand China without a detailed knowledge of the real elite. This was proved by the Cultural Revolution. Card indices on this elite are maintained in a number of centres and the China Documenta-tion Center (West Germany) wishes to help in the co-ordination of such work.
