## A NEW SOCIETY THE SOCIETY FOR THE SOCIAL HISTORY OF MEDICINE

The Society has been founded to promote a better understanding of the relationship between Medicine and the Social Sciences. Some knowledge and understanding of historical developments will further this aim and will bring together those engaged in academic and practical work such as doctors, sociologists, teachers and those engaged in public health, occupational medicine and community welfare services.

Papers presented at these meetings as well as articles and shorter notes submitted will be published twice a year.

It is hoped that there will be international as well as national response.
