Authors should send three copies of their manuscripts (double spaced), which will not be returned. After initial screening by the editors, selected manuscripts will be reviewed anonymously. Publication decisions will be made with regard to the overall composition of each issue. Cambridge University Press provides 25 free offorints to authors of published articles.
