Library of Congress transliteration should be used. *Articles should contain a final section in which the author sets out his main conclusions in a way which will be intelligible to the nonspecialist reader.* In general, articles should not exceed twenty-five pages, except where especially justified, e.g., by extensive documentation, tables, or charts. Manuscripts will not be returned unless specifically requested. The policy of the *Slavic Review* is not to consider materials that have been published or that are being considered for publication elsewhere.
