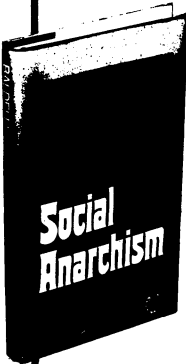

SOCIAL ANARCHISM by Giovanni Baldelli

"This is a marvelously exciting book, and surely one of the finest anarchist works ever written.
