The American Republic

Its Government and Politics

Peter H. Odegard & Hans Baerwald

This important new text—coming in February—is a comprehensive analysis of the spirit and structure of the American Republic. The book is primarily concerned with political power, with the ideas, values, and theories which have served to give direction and purpose to government in the United States. Emphasis is on process and policy, rather than on description of form and structure. After an introduction, major sections of the book cover politics and parties, the Constitution, the basic structure of government, the Bill of Rights, the federal system, state and local government, and domestic and foreign policies. The book is highly readable; the illustrations well integrated with the text. There will be a Teacher's Manual.

Readings in American Government

Peter H. Odegard

A collection of some 150 readings and documents in American government, edited to accompany any standard text in American government. In selecting the readings the editors have ranged widely and resourcefully through the literature. Nearly half of the selections are documents, the vast majority of which are not otherwise conveniently available. Head notes are short, for the editors believe that their function is to be helpful but not obtrusive.
