GEGEL

Raymond Plant

Dr Plant's stimulating book is the first concise study of Hegel's political thought for many years. Most of the previous commentaries on Hegel's social and political writings tended to isolate his discussions of political life and institutions from his central philosophical concerns.

Dr Plant's achievement is to demonstrate the interconnection between the political and metaphysical writings, thereby providing the student with a point of entry into Hegel's system of ideas. He emphasises that these metaphysical writings are permeated by certain broad political concerns—the decline of the community in the modern world, the general fragmentation of modern culture, the baneful social effects of much contemporary theology—and that these concerns stand at the very heart of Hegel's thinking.

Indeed far from Hegel's political thinking being a detachable addendum to a metaphysical system, his metaphysic is itself socially and politically engaged. Dr Plant proceeds to trace the development and elaboration of this political commitment from Hegel's early theological writings to the philosophical and political masterpieces of his maturity, showing in a novel way the continuity of Hegel's thought.

This interpretation of Hegel's thought will be of importance to students and teachers of philosophy and political theory, and, because of its insistence on the deep connections in Hegel's mind between an adequate political culture and an adequate theology, it will be of interest to theologians. Anyone interested in the political and cultural problems of modern society or wishing to understand some of the rapidly developing careers of contemporary social philosophers will be helped by this lucid analysis of Hegel.

Dr Plant is at present Chairman of the Department of Philosophy in the University of Manchester. His book is the first in a series which will contain volumes on Bentham, Burke, Locke, Machiavelli, Marx, Mill and others.
