

and will afford valuable information and food for reflection to the thoughtful surgeon. We learn that the septum separating the sinuses, though usually very thin, is not often, if ever, perforated, unless pathologically—in fact, Dr. Turner has never found a natural perforation. The results of minute and careful investigations of the varieties of the sinuses, with a table of average dimensions, completes this chapter.

The ethmoidal labyrinth next comes under review, and is followed by the sphenoidal sinus, both short accounts, but the result of careful work. The ensuing chapter is on the openings of the various cells.

The most interesting chapter, if it is not equal in practical value to its predecessors, is that on the comparative anatomy in human crania. Dr. Turner has had excellent opportunities of investigating large numbers of skulls, some collected by his father, Sir William Turner, and others, both in public and private collections—nearly two hundred in all—and he has put these opportunities to good use. We especially recommend a careful perusal of this chapter; it possesses unique features, and opens up a wide field of thought.

The rest of the work treats of pathological states, transillumination, etc., and is well worthy of attention, though it contains little that is new.

The illustrations, numerous though they are, are all of the highest excellence, and will bear comparison with any we have seen; they are true to nature, and works of high artistic merit. The book itself is written in excellent style: all points are made clear, there is much original work in it, and it will take a high place in the literature of the subject.

We offer the author our sincere congratulations, and to our readers we heartily commend the work. To all alike who take any interest in the sinuses of the head it will prove of the greatest use; it is a storehouse of information on the subject.
