

Year of 2nd Award: 1996 (Period June 1994-June 1996)

**What?** Every two years a scientific award, amounting to US\$ 25,000, provided by the CINP (Collegium Internationale Neuro-Psychopharmacologicum) through an educational grant from Janssen Research Council.

Who? Any young investigator (less than 45 years old on January 1st of the year of the award) who has performed outstanding research in the area of Clinical Neuroscience of Schizophrenia at a university institute or any other acknowledged scientific institution that is independent of the pharmaceutical industry.
