An original, controversial narrative by a German deputy to three governor-generals of the Sudan, C. G. Gordon Pasha and his two Egyptian successors. By an extraordinary turn of fortune Carl Christian Giegler left the factory floor of Siemens Brothers' works at Woolwich in 1873 to become a telegraph engineer in the Sudan and emerged six years

later as His Excellency the Deputy Governor-General and a pasha.

It was mainly the solid virtues of his German artisan's upbringing which moved Gordon to secure for him such spectacular preferment from his master the Khedive Ismail. Giegler turned out to be one of Gordon's wiser nominations for, in spite of his new life in the highest ranks of the Turkish-Egyptian élite, he never lost his native values: his personal frugality, his ability to distinguish a gentleman from a colourful fraud, his searing judgements on lazy bounders whether Egyptians or those British adventurers who sought employment in the Sudan simply as an excuse to shoot big game. He never hid his own weaknesses and was no flatterer of others; when he wrote of Gordon, who was indeed his benefactor, he criticized kindly and with gratitude.

With little administrative experience and no social advantages, he worked with his Muslim superiors and colleagues and with the British overlords who, after 1882, established themselves in Egypt and its possessions; with the quarrelsome consuls of the European Powers and with the people of the vast majority, the Sudanese, initially in peace and finally in the bloody violence of the Mahdist war.
